

Program	LEA American Rescue Plan (ARP-ESSER III)
Purpose:	Under the Elementary & Secondary School Emergency Relief III ARP (American Rescue Plan) Fund (ESSER III), the Department awards grants to State educational agencies (SEAs) for the purpose of providing local educational agencies (LEAs), including charter schools that are LEAs, with emergency relief funds to address the impact that the Novel Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) has had, and continues to have, on elementary and secondary schools across the nation. LEAs must provide services to students and teachers in public schools as required under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.
Grant Due Date	No later than June 30 th , 2022
Reimbursement Period:	March 13, 2020 – September 30, 2024 as long as requirements are met.
Begin Date:	July 1, 2021 or the receipt date of a substantially approvable application, whichever is later.

Requirements



LEA must reserve not less than 20% of its total ESSER ARP allocation to address learning loss through the implementation of evidence-based intervention and ensure that such interventions respond to students' academic, social and emotional needs and address the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on underrepresented student subgroups.

Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan: Section 2001(i) of the ARP Act requires an LEA that receives ARP ESSER funds to develop and make publicly available on the LEA's website, within 30 days after receiving its allocation, a plan for the safe return to in person instruction and continuity of services. Prior to making the plan publicly available. The LEA must seek public comment on the plan and take such comments into consideration when developing the plan. The LEA must also create an ESSER use of Funds Plans within 90 days of receiving the ESSER Funds. The plan should also be made publicly available on the LEA's website and submitted to ISBE.

All FFATA (Federal Funding and Transparency Act) and GATA (Grant Accounting & Transparency Act) Assurances must be met ensure that funds will be used for activities authorized under the Elementary & Secondary School Emergency Relief III Funds of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.

ESSER III Allocation Calculation

Under ARP ESSER, the **SEA must allocate at least 90% of the ESSER funds it receives as subgrants to LEAs** in proportion to the amount of funds each LEA received under part, A of title I of the ESEA in the most recent fiscal year.

Section 2001(e)(1) of the ARP Act requires an LEA to reserve not less than 20% of its ARP ESSER allocation to address the academic impact of lost instructional time through the implementation of evidence-based interventions.

Section 2001(f) requires ISBE to set aside ARP ESSER funds for <u>State-level reservations</u> to address evidence-based activities and interventions to respond to students' social, emotional, mental health, and academic needs and address the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on students from low-income families, students of color, English learners, children with disabilities, students experiencing homelessness, children and youth in foster care, and migratory students. The intent and purpose must address the three required use of funds; Learning Loss, Summer School and After School. These are considered set-asides.

Payment of contract services with the 7 th University to provide STEM education, after-school enrichment, social emotional programs, and career exploration for Colin Powell students. The total amount of the program is \$60,000. The program will assist in the reduction of learning loss.	60,000
Payment of 4 technology teachers for our elementary schools coding classes. The classes will be 3 hours weekly for 9 weeks. Totaling 27 hours of instruction. Teachers will be paid \$35.00 hourly, totaling \$945.00 each and \$3,780 in total. To maximize participation and social distancing, we will hold two 9 week sessions during the 2022 and 2023 school-year, totaling \$7,560. This is an enrichment program.	7,560
Estimated contract services to implement mentoring and tutoring programs at the elementary schools to assist in the reduction of learning loss.	86,000

Elementary schools playground equipment to allow for the required social distancing, support social emotional learning, and create an explorative and creating learning environment. According to ISBE children are required 30 minutes of daily play time. State procurement process will be followed.	365,000
Facility flooring upgrade to remove old carpeting in classrooms throughout the school district to improve safety. During COVID-19, schools were inspected for safety, air quality, heating, and ventilation. The old carpeting is a barrier to air quality because it holds dust, can weaken the immune system and promote respiratory issues. Flooring is easier to maintain and will increase the safety and welfare of students and staff. State procurement process will be followed.	342,524
HVAC installation throughout the school district to improve ventilation will be performed by Midwest Mechanical. State procurement processed was followed.	326,000
